


#### President's Ponderings

#### ANNUAL VEHICLE INSPECTION DAY - Sunday 26th November

All vehicles on Conditional Registration must be inspected and passed for roadworthiness prior to registration renewal each year. The CAMC Inspection Day will be held on Sunday  $26^{th}$  November 2023, commencing at 9AM at the Automotive Workshop of the Cootamundra TAFE College, Mackay Street, Cootamundra.

When you present your vehicle for inspection, please bring with you:

- Registration renewal papers (if you have received them), and
- Annual Club Membership renewal fee (\$30) or your receipt showing that you have already paid.

When your vehicle has been inspected and passed **and your membership paid**, the "Conditional Registration Historic Vehicle Declaration" form (included with your registration renewal - but I have some if you have not received your renewal papers) can be completed and signed declaring that:

- The vehicle is in a safe operating condition, and
- Annual Club Membership renewal fee (\$30) has been paid.

If your registration renewal is due during December or January bring the vehicle to the inspection day even though you may not have received your renewal papers. For new members who may wish to put a vehicle on Conditional Registration for the first time, RMS application forms will be available.

There will be tea and coffee available on the day.

### 100th Anniversary of the Australian Motorcycle Grand Prix

Plans are underway to recognise the 100th Anniversary of Australia's first official Motorcycle Grand Prix, which took place on 23rd June 1924.

Coming together for this are Goulburn Mulwaree Council, the Goulburn Chamber of Commerce, the Goulburn Motorcycle Club and the Classic Riders Club of Goulburn.

#### Points to note:

- 1. On Sunday 23rd June 2024, the actual date of the original GP, there will be a replication of the events, as close as possible, from the original programme.
- 2. As in 1924, the route will commence near Mountain Ash Road.
- 3. Stations of interest along the way have been invited to take part as food/rest stops catering to riders and visitors, and to offer good views of the rally entrants as they file past.
- 4. On Saturday 22nd June, track runs, junior events, women's events, displays, history replays and more are planned.
- 5. An official dinner is planned for the evening of Saturday 22nd June, including a key note speaker and guests of honour high profile motorcycle riders from all categories of motorcycling.
- 6. Families of those who raced in the original race will also be included in the celebrations, and organisers are keen to find a motorbike that participated (or anything from a nut and bolt to an entire bike).
- 7. Leading up to the weekend, the Goulburn community will be host to celebratory activities set to draw much interest. Goulburn's place in motor racing history is significant, and this milestone of 100 years offers the perfect opportunity to announce the depth and strength of this history.
- 8. The race start in 1924 was near the area where we now have a motorcycle monument. The Custodian of this is the Classic Riders Club, who have maintained the area since 2004. This secluded nook along Mountain Ash Road offers a place for quiet reflection. Club members are remembered on this site, with plaques to honour the part they played within the Club, and it will be at this place that the 100th Anniversary was launched on 20 June 2023.





The 'sapphire' blue car was sold to a friend (against my usual policy), so I saw it occasionally for a few years until he replaced it with a Range Rover.




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

#### **GENERAL BUSINESS:**

**Possible New Member:** Members welcomed Brian Medhurst to the meeting. Brian has a passion for motorcycles and has expressed interest in becoming a member of the CAMC.

**Run Packs:** It was decided that Craig and John Simp. would meet at the Cootamundra showground at 7:00am to finalise and hand out run packs on the day.

**Event Start:** Mark said he was trying to get Eddie Collingridge to again wave the riders off on the start of the rally and possibly Don Manwaring to welcome the entrants, but also start the rally in the event that Eddie is not available.

**Advertising:** Mark said that he was not going to pursue TV advertising this year because of the lack of interest shown by that form of media last year. Instead he said he would contact the *Coota Times* and ABC Radio to get the message out. All agreed this to be a good idea.

**Banner:** Jeff Price volunteered to erect the club banner on the fence, right hand side of the gate the morning of the Rally.

**Late Entries:** A discussion took place about the availability of meals for late entries. It was decided to order four extra meals to help cover this problem. Moved Geoff, seconded Mark.

**Dinner:** Mal and Lin Chaplin have once again agreed to set up the tables for the dinner for Saturday night at the RSL Club. They will use the same theme as last year with the table cloths being black and white on alternate tables, mimicking the checkered flag.

Marshals: Doug advised the meeting that he had rallied together enough officials and backup drivers for the event. #### **Product Review - Fuel Doctor**

I don't often spruik products, but lately I've been telling anyone who'll listen about my results using Fuel Doctor. Please do your own research, but here are my findings.

I grabbed a bottle of this when I was sick of cleaning my CX500 carbs every time I left it parked for a few months. I worked out that the float needles were sticking shut, stopping the carb bowls from filling.

The instructions suggest 1ml per litre (which makes this a cheapo additive), with an initial "shock" treatment of 5ml per litre.

I just topped up the tank and added the frugal 1ml per litre and set off to Bungendore for a pie. Didn't really notice any difference. Had my pie and headed home . . . Hello, there's my smooth running CX500 with all its ponies back in the stable! Not only that, it starts cold off the button beautifully. Has never done that in the 10 years I've owned it.

Same thing with Lisa's 1951 Rover car. I used to take the top off the float bowl to manually prime it after sitting. Not any more, and it runs great.

It smoothed out the idle on all of our cars. Ford Maverick 4WD petrol, VX Commodore Supercharged V6, VE Commodore SS V8, and BMW X5 V8 petrol. The BMW fuel economy improved too.

We've now added it to our older Triumph Twins and ES2 Nortons which all had stale fuel. Too early for results yet, so I'll provide an update sometime.

The sales blurb and online videos say that it extends fuel life by up to two years, dissolves the lacquer that builds up in carbs and injectors, and kills the bacteria that can grow in modern fuels that have absorbed too much moisture.

It doesn't seem to affect octane. My Ford Maverick pings like a bugger on stale '98' but runs fine with Fuel Doctor added to a fresh top-up of the same 98 octane.

Like I said, do your own research, but I'll keep using it if it saves me a few carb rebuilds.

The speeds set down are not excessive. The lowest powered machines will have no trouble keeping up. High speeds carry penalties as competitors will lose points for early arrival at controls.
